1. **Federal Aid** — Students across the United States are eligible.

Apply via www.fafsa.gov beginning October 1, 2018

2. **State of Florida Aid** — Only Florida students are eligible.

- Tuition Assistance
- Special Interest (Scholarships for Children of Deceased or Disabled Veterans)

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3. **Institutional Aid** – Assistance from the college you will attend

- Grants and Scholarships
- Private Scholarships
- PERKINS Student Loans

Apply via the college you will attend. The financial aid office at your school might review students for eligibility at the time of application. However, check your school's website for requirements so you do not miss an opportunity.

4. **Private Aid** – Assistance from organizations interested in helping students

- Scholarships via your place of employment or a parent's employer
- Scholarships via corporations, local businesses, special interest groups
- Scholarships via national, state, local organizations

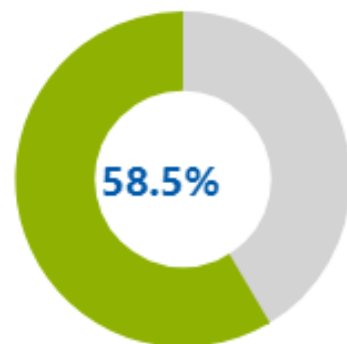

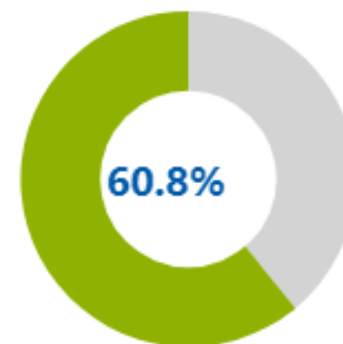

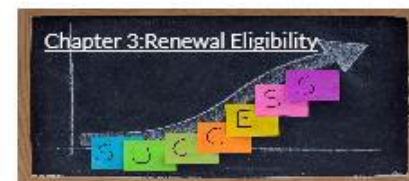

- Bright Futures GPA is NOT the same as report card GPA.
- Bright Futures weighs honors, AP, and dual enrollment classes equally with 0.5 per credit earned – NOT 1.0 weight for AP or DE!
- Bright Futures GPA = 16 credits- Semester grades in approved English (4 credits), Social Studies (3 credits), Science (3 credits), Math (4 credits), and World Language (2 credits) courses only.
- ASL counts as a world language for FL public schools.
- Bright Futures will also accept two additional academic electives toward the GPA calculation if it benefits the student.
- Remember, you have until graduation day to increase your GPA, credits, and community service hours.

Gold Seal CAPE Scholars (GSC) Award Requirements

Florida high school students who wish to qualify for the Florida Gold Seal CAPE (GSC) award must meet the following initial eligibility requirements:

- Earn a minimum of 5 postsecondary credit hours through CAPE industry certifications which articulate for college credit
- Complete 30 service hours

Gold Seal CAPE Scholars (GSC)

GSC may be funded if enrolled in a career education or certificate program.

Upon completion of an associate in science degree program that articulates to a bachelor of science degree, a GSC Scholar may also receive an award for a maximum of 60 credit hours toward a bachelor of science degree program.

Upon completion of an associate in applied science program, a GSC Scholar may also receive an award for a maximum of 60 credit hours toward a bachelor of applied science degree program.

Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV) Award Requirements

- Achieve the required weighted minimum 3.0 GPA in the non-elective high school courses
- Take at least 3 full credits in a single Career and Technical Education program
- Achieve the required minimum 3.5 unweighted GPA in the career education courses
- Achieve the required minimum score on the ACT[®], SAT[®] or Florida Postsecondary Education Readiness Test (P.E.R.T.) exams
- Complete 30 service hours

Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV)

GSV Scholars awards may only be used at postsecondary institutions that offer:

- Applied Technology Diploma
- Technical Degree Education Program (associate in applied science or associate in science)
- Career Education Certificate Program

Bright Futures Award Amounts

2018-2019



Florida Academic Scholars (FAS) will receive an award to cover 100% of tuition and applicable fees and \$300 for both fall and spring semesters for additional educational expenses.

Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS) will receive an award to cover 75% of tuition and applicable fees. Students attending a public institution will have tuition and applicable fees covered.

Award Amounts (Continued)

- For the GSC and GSV awards, students will receive the specified award amounts established annually by the Florida Legislature in the General Appropriations Act.

Community Service Hours

- Students must complete service hours during high school and by high school graduation.
- Service hours may include work for a nonprofit community service organization.
- The hours must be documented in writing, and signed by the student, the student's parent or guardian, and representative of the organization.

How to Write a Scholarship Essay

When you are drafting your scholarship essay, here are some helpful tips to keep in mind.

1. **Start the essay writing process early.**

Leave yourself plenty of time to produce a well thought-out entry. Take the time to brainstorm your ideas, create an outline, and edit your entry as you would for any essay writing assignment for your English class.

2. **Understand the scholarship provider's overall mission and purpose.**

Each scholarship provider is looking for students who meet certain criteria. Consider writing about an experience or interest that highlights your strong ties to the organization's mission. Genuine passion and enthusiasm for your topic will show through in your essay writing.

3. **Follow the scholarship essay instructions.**

Make sure to follow all of the necessary steps and review them before submitting your scholarship essay. Trust us, some of the brightest students have missed out on the chance to earn scholarships dollars all because they neglected to follow instructions. You don't want to fall into that category!

4. **Steer clear from essay topics that focus on negativity or pessimism.**

Scholarship committees would rather see how you overcame hardships and succeeded despite the obstacles in your path (or what you learned from the times you failed).

5. **Don't be afraid to get personal.**

Share something about who you are. This is your chance to elaborate on elsewhere on your application you wouldn't have had the opportunity to do so. Telling your story makes an essay genuine and ultimately more memorable to the scholarship committee.

6. **Seek out writing advice and feedback.**

Asking teachers, counselors, family members, or trustworthy friends for feedback on your essay will result in a better final product.

7. **Yes, spelling and grammar matter.**


Scholarship committees do notice grammar mistakes. Even tiny errors can distract a reader from your overall message. Before you submit your application make sure you take the time to proofread your essay from beginning to end.

HELPFUL TIPS

Scholarship Tips

- Start searching for scholarships early and continue searching throughout college.
- Apply to EVERY scholarship for which you are eligible.
- Essays can be reused and tailored for each new application.
- Review your social media accounts and remove inappropriate material.

Get Organized!

- Make a list of deadlines and don't miss them.
 - Keep a folder/file/binder with everything that is needed to apply for multiple scholarships.
 - ✓ ACT/SAT/PERT scores
 - ✓ High school transcript (request one from Parchment)
 - ✓ Letters of recommendation (because you may be able to use one for multiple scholarships)
 - ✓ Resume of activities, community service, and leadership roles
 - ✓ Essays (because you may be able to use one essay for multiple scholarships)
 - Create a new email account solely for college information and make sure you have an appropriate email address.

Beware of Scams!




- NEVER pay for scholarships or searches.
- Scholarships are never “guaranteed”.
- Feel too good to be true? It probably is! Do more research and ask around.
- Trust your instincts.
- Scholarships are gifts; they never have to be repaid.
- Never give out bank account, credit card, or social security information.



Financial Aid

Financial aid is any resource that can assist in offsetting the cost of college. It covers such expenses as books and supplies, tuition and fees, room and board, and transportation. Typically, students/families will apply for financial aid at four levels: Federal, State, Institutional and Private Aid.

Note: No one should assume they would not qualify for financial aid! Scholarships and university programs consider a wide range of factors when awarding money for education.



Federal Student Aid

Federal student aid is money that students can use to help pay for college. There are three main types of aid: grants, work-study and loans.

Who gets it?

Everyone should apply for federal student aid regardless of income.

How to apply?

Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) at www.fafsa.gov

When to apply?

FAFSA becomes available on October 1. Students should apply as soon as possible senior year.



State Financial Aid

State student aid is money that students can use to help pay for college. There are many grants and scholarships available but **Bright Futures** and **First Generation Grant** are the most common.

Who gets it?

Everyone should apply for Florida financial aid regardless of income, GPA, or test scores.

How to apply?

Complete the Florida Financial Aid Application at <http://www.floridastudentfinancialaid.org/>

When to apply?

The Florida financial aid application becomes available October 1. Students should apply as soon as possible senior year.



Institutional Financial Aid

Institutional (college/university) student aid is money that students can use to help pay for college. Often times the college or university will require a separate application for aid.

Who gets it?

Students should talk to the college's financial aid office to determine what the qualifications are for their financial aid.

How to apply?

Colleges usually have a separate application process for financial aid. Check the schools website to determine how you should apply for financial aid.

When to apply?

Financial aid deadlines vary from school to school but keep checking the schools website, and apply as soon as possible.



Private Aid

Private Aid are scholarships that can come from a variety of sources.

Who gets it?

There are a wide range of scholarships that are available to many different students.

How to apply?

Follow directions for each specific scholarship.

* Google, "Scholarships for..."

When to apply?

Start thinking about and applying for scholarships in ninth grade! If you qualify, apply!
