

## Specific Requirements for the Scholarships

### Florida Academic Scholars (FAS)

### Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS)

Florida high school students who wish to qualify for the Florida Academic Scholars (FAS) award or the Florida Medallion Scholars (FMS) award must meet the following initial eligibility requirements:

- Graduate high school from a Florida public high school with a standard Florida high school diploma (high school graduation requirements), graduate from a registered Florida Department of Education private high school, earn a GED, complete a home education program, or graduate from a non-Florida high school (OOS);
- Complete the required high school coursework;
- Achieve the required minimum high school grade point average (GPA);
- Achieve the required minimum score on either the ACT<sup>®</sup> or SAT<sup>®</sup> college entrance exam; and
- Complete the required number of service hours.

<sup>1</sup> The required coursework aligns with the State University System admission requirements found in regulation 6.002.

<sup>2</sup> SAT<sup>®</sup> score requirement is applicable to both the former SAT<sup>®</sup> and the redesigned SAT<sup>®</sup> introduced in 2016.

### High School Course Credits

For both scholarships, the required coursework aligns with the State University System admission requirements. The world language requirement can be met by demonstrating proficiencies based on scores on Credit-By-Exam Equivalencies or other university approved means. Otherwise, the high school transcript must include a world language “completer” course to show that the world language requirement has been met. Please refer to the Bright Futures Course Table for specific information on which courses count toward FAS/FMS requirements.

# Community Service Hours

Community service hours are NOT required for graduation.

Community service hours **are required** for all Bright Futures Scholarship Awards:

- Florida Academic Scholars (100 hrs)
- Florida Medallion Scholars (75 hrs), and
- Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (30 hrs)

Please note that many other scholarship organizations consider community service when selecting award recipients. Students may begin logging hours the summer before their freshman year.

**Below are some examples and some non-examples of eligible community service:**

<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>▪ Service to a government agency</li><li>▪ Service to a not – for – profit local, national or international organization</li><li>▪ Service to a school or school organization – in which a grade is not awarded</li><li>▪ Service to a religious organization</li><li>▪ Participation in not – for – profit Fine Arts performances or exhibitions</li><li>▪ VPS hours provided a grade is not awarded</li><li>▪ Non – paid internships at a not – for – profit organization with prior school official approval</li><li>▪ Career Academy non-paid internships</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>▪ Self-reported or parent reported hours <b>will not be</b> recognized</li><li>▪ Family related activities</li><li>▪ Hours in which students <b>are</b> compensated either monetarily or materially</li><li>▪ School related activities that have required attendance and/or are a part of the course requirement to earn credit</li><li>▪ Attendance at meetings which are required as part of membership in a club or organization</li><li>▪ Activities that cannot be documented on business letterhead</li><li>▪ Volunteer services for a for-profit business</li><li>▪ Fostering animals does not count for Bright Futures hours</li></ul>

## How to submit Community Service Hours

1. The hours must be documented in writing on the letterhead of the non-profit organization.
2. Three signatures are required: the student, the student's parent or guardian, and the representative of the organization.
3. Letters must be turned in to Mrs. Richards in the main Guidance office.
4. It is recommended that students keep a copy of community service letters for their records.

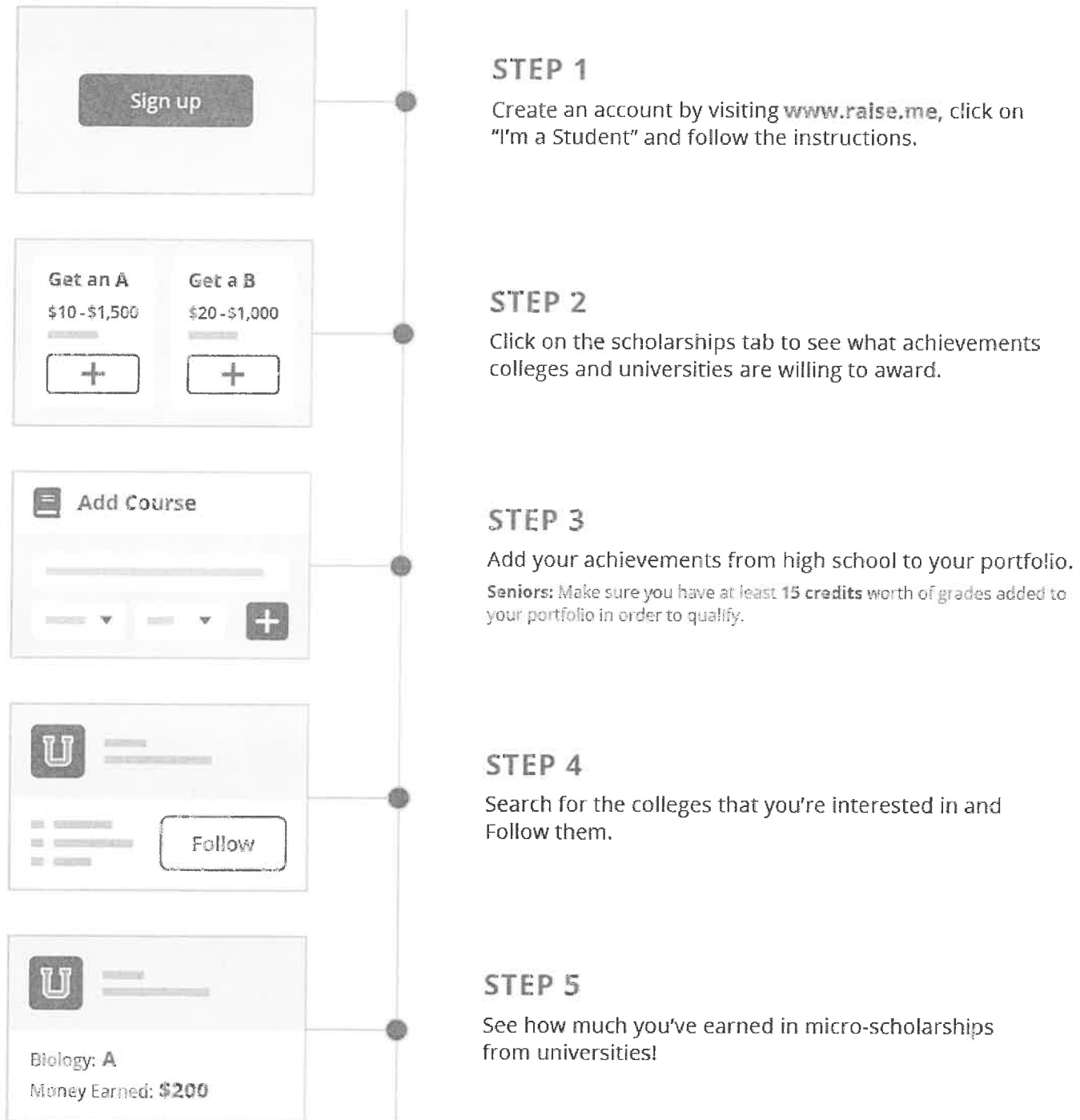

# Scholarship Tips!

- Start searching for scholarships early and continue searching throughout college.
- Make a list of deadlines and don't miss them.
- Apply to EVERY scholarship for which you are eligible.
- Essays can be reused and tailored for each new application.
- Review your social media accounts and remove inappropriate material.
- Make sure you have an appropriate e-mail address.
- Get Organized

Keep a folder/file/binder with everything that is needed to apply for multiple scholarships.

1. ACT/SAT/PERT scores
2. High school transcript (request one from Parchment)
3. Letters of recommendation (because you may be able to use one for multiple scholarships)
4. Resume of activities, community service, and leadership roles
5. Essays (because you may be able to use one essay for multiple scholarships)
