

When to apply?

- Scholarships
 - NOW and continue throughout college
- College/University/Vocational School
 - By October 31 of senior year
 - Can start as early as summer between 11/12 grade year
 - You are applying with the cumulative GPA from the end of junior year and ACT and SAT test scores obtained by August of senior year

What to think about when searching for a college

- What is the graduation rate?
- What is the cost?
- What is the percentage of students who come back after freshmen year?
- Does the college offer my major?
- Compare and research colleges

Applying to College

- Begin the search process now
 - Make a list of colleges or other postsecondary opportunities that are interesting to you
 - The colleges that you are interested in can fall into one of the following categories:
 - Match (your academic credentials fall well within the school's range for average freshmen)
 - Reach (your academic credentials a little fall below the school's range for the average freshmen)
 - Safety (your academic credentials fall above the school's range for the average freshmen)
 - Request information about each college
 - If possible, visit colleges that you are interested in

Get Organized

- Keep a folder/file/binder with everything that is needed to apply for multiple scholarships and colleges.
 - Application deadlines
 - ACT/SAT/ scores
 - High school transcript (request from Parchment)
 - Letters of recommendation (because you may be able to use one for multiple applications)
 - Resume of activities, community service, and leadership roles
 - Essays (because you may be able to use one essay for multiple applications)
 - High school code 100-809
 - Parents level of education, occupation, income
- Get an appropriate e-mail address
 - JohnSmith01@gmail.com (YES)
 - BigDaddy01@gmail.com (NO)

College Application Fees

- College application fees vary but could be between \$35-\$50, depending on college
- There is never a fee associated with scholarships
- SAT, ACT, or NACAC college application fee waivers can be used to waive college application fees
 - If you took the ACT or SAT with a fee waiver, see your counselor about obtaining college application fee waivers.
- If using fee waivers, contact each college to determine how they would like the fee waivers submitted. Every college has a different process.

ACT and SAT Score Reports

· ACT

- www.actstudent.org
- Log in and send your scores to the college(s) of your choice
- If you didn't send scores when you registered for the test, then this will cost money

SAT

- www.collegeboard.org
- Log in and send your scores to the college(s) of your choice
- If you didn't send scores when you registered for the test, then this will cost money

High School Transcript

- Official record of academic performance and testing history
 - Different than a credit detail report that a counselor can print for you
- Request transcript via Parchment https://www.parchment.com/u/registration/9276/account
- Check with the college or scholarship organization to determine how they want to receive the transcript
 - Electronically
 - US Mail
- Transcripts MUST be kept in sealed envelope, otherwise they are invalid

Letter of Recommendation

- Check to see if letter of recommendation is required
- Ask an adult (but not a relative) that knows you really well
- Give them a resume or brag sheet of your achievements to help them
- Ask well in advance of the deadline
- Give instructions to writer about how to submit the letter of recommendation.
 - o Directly to you?
 - Uploaded electronically?
 - Sent directly to college or scholarship organization?
- Send a thank you note!

College Admissions and Scholarship Essay

- Check to see if an essay is required
- Check to determine the essay prompt or question
- Draft initial essay
- Proofread for spelling and grammar
- Ask two people to read your essay
- Revise your essay
- Proofread your revision
- Ask two people to read your final draft
- Proofread again
- Upload essay to electronic application





- Start searching for scholarships early and continue searching throughout college.
- Get organized.
- Make a list of deadlines and don't miss them.
- Apply to EVERY scholarship for which you are eligible.
- Essays can be reused and tailored for each new application.
- Review your social media accounts and remove inappropriate material.
- Make sure you have an appropriate e-mail address.
