There are various ways students can seek Financial Aid to help pay for College.

Federal Aid - Apply for the FAFSA beginning December 1st

State of Florida Aid - Bright Futures & Special Interest Scholarships

Institutional Aid - Visit the college and university websites.

Private Aid - Search for Scholarships via national, state and local organizations

Counselors will be providing a Financial Aid Workshop for Seniors the first two weeks of October through English classes.

Scholarships

- Provide financial support for students to help pay for college
- Enable students to obtain education they may not have access to otherwise
- Help reduce debt

Students can earn multiple scholarships, there is no limit!



Before students begin the process of applying for Scholarships, they need to GET ORGANIZED!

- > ACT/SAT/CLT test scores
- ➤ Unofficial high school transcript students should order a transcript to be sent to their email through Parchment (link is on the BTHS website).
- Letters of recommendation from Teacher(s)
- Create a resume of activities, community service, leadership roles and skills
- Essays (you may be able to use one essay for multiple scholarships)


NEXT STEPS


- Create a dedicated scholarship email account with an appropriate email address. (FirstName.LastName@gmail.com)
- > Review social media accounts and remove inappropriate material.
- Make a list of deadlines and don't miss them.
- When writing essays, make sure they follow all directions exactly, stick to the prompt, use the accurate word count, and try approaching the topic in a creative way.
- Essays can often be reused and tailored for each new scholarship.
- Apply to EVERY scholarship for which the student is eligible.

Financial Assistance for Education If you don't apply, you won't qualify!

Federal Aid

Grants and Scholarships -- Work Study -- Guaranteed Student Loans

- U.S. Armed Forces (see <u>StudentAid.gov/military</u>)
- Apply via <u>www.fafsa.gov</u> beginning December 1st of senior year

Institutional Aid

Start researching institutional scholarships by visiting the college and university websites. Some schools require a separate application. Some schools automatically consider students who apply for admissions by the priority deadline.

State of Florida Aid

Only Florida students are eligible.

Gold Seal Vocational Scholar (GVS) can only be used to fund: an Applied Technology Diploma, Technical Degree Ed Program (Associate in Applied Science or Associate in Science), or a Career Education Certificate Program.

Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program Florida Gold Seal Vocational Scholars (GSV) 2023-24

<u>Initial Eligibility Requirements</u>: (As determined by the Florida Department of Education.)

- 1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31 after high school graduation.
- 2. Graduate with a standard Florida high school diploma or its equivalent.
- Achieve the required weighted 3.0 GPA in the non-elective high school courses.
- Complete at least 3 full credits in a single Career and Technical Education program.
- 5. Achieve the required minimum 3.5 unweighted GPA in the single Career and Technical Education program.
- Complete at least 30 volunteer service hours, 100 paid work hours, or a combination that equals a minimum of 100 total hours.
- 7. Achieve the required minimum scores on one of the college entrance exams per the chart below no later than August 31 of the year the student graduates from high school.

Required test scores follow those established by Rule 6A-10.0315, Florida Administrative Code.



- Bright Futures GPA is **NOT** the same as your cumulative weighted or unweighted GPA.
- Bright Futures bases your GPA on 16 academic credits (4 English, 4 Math, 3 Sciences, 3 Social Studies, and 2 Foreign Languages)
- Bright Futures weighs honors, AP, and dual enrollment classes equally with 0.5 per credit earned NOT 1.0 weight for AP or DE.
- Bright Futures will also accept two additional academic electives toward the GPA calculation if it **benefits** the student.



- You are permitted to use qualifying scores through August 31, 2024 for ACT, SAT or CLT to qualify for the Bright Futures test criteria if you did not qualify prior to graduation.
- You must **APPLY** for the scholarship by submitting the Florida Financial Aid Application during senior year. The application opens each year on October 1.
- Bright Futures Scholarships will renew automatically each year if the student maintains the required GPA and credit hours.



- "Bright Futures" receives student transcript information (courses, grades, and community service/work hours) twice a year (end of 1st semester and end of 2nd semester/end of school year) when the district uploads transcripts.
- "Bright Futures" receives ACT, SAT and CLT test scores ONLY when students report scores to Florida state colleges and universities. Bright Futures will superscore score reports sent to Florida state colleges and universities.
- Bright Futures GPA CANNOT be viewed in HAC.
- Juniors and Seniors will receive their Bright Future reports

Community Service/Work Hours

- Not needed for graduation
- Needed for Bright Futures
- The goal should be to complete 100 hours of community service/work hours by the end of 11th grade
- Students may combine community service and work hours but the hours must equate to 100

 - Remember to keep a copy of verification letters for your records




Submitting Community Service/Work Hours

- Submit service/work hours to Ms. Richards in the Main Guidance office or at Kathleen.Richards@stjohns.k12.fl.us
- Schedule meetings with college representatives and ask questions about financial aid and Bright Futures.
- Begin planning for next year's courses with college and Bright Futures in mind.
- Take SAT, ACT, CLT and send scores to a Florida school.

- Review your Bright Futures Report.
- See your school counselor if there are any errors on your transcript.
- Take note of what is "Missing" to qualify for each award.
- Take steps to improve your Bright Futures
 GPA if it is borderline.
- Submit any remaining service/work hours by winter break.
- Take or re-take SAT, ACT or CLT and report your scores to a Florida school.

- APPLY!
- APPLY NOW!
- DO NOT WAIT TO APPLY!
- Students do not have to be eligible for Bright Futures to apply. You can apply now and become eligible by graduation.
- You will NOT be eligible if you do not APPLY!
