# Graduation requirements for a Standard 24 Credit Diploma

- Assessments (Algebra 1 EOC and Grade 10 ELA FAST Test)
- 2.0 Cumulative, Unweighted GPA
- 24 specific credits

#### Assessments

- Must pass two assessments to graduate with a High School Standard Diploma
  - Algebra 1 EOC B.E.S.T. (level 3 or above) Scale Score of 497 or
    - ∘ ACT Math 16 or
    - SAT Math 420 or
    - PSAT/NMSQT Math 430 or
    - FSA Geometry EOC 499 -Level 3
    - CLT Quantitative Reasoning Section 14
  - Grade 10 FAST ELA (level 3 or above) Scale Score 350 or
    - ACT Reading and English average 18 or
    - PSAT R&W 470
    - SAT Evidence-Based Reading and Writing 490
    - CLT Verbal Reasoning and Grammar/Writing Sections Sum 39

### Credits



- 24 credits must be earned in all of the following:
  - English 1, 2, 3, and 4
  - Algebra, Geometry, and two additional Math courses
  - Biology and two additional Sciences
  - World History, US History, Government, and Economics
  - 1 Fine/Performing/Practical art or CTE
  - HOPE
  - 8 elective credits (to include .5 credit of Personal Finance and Money)
    - If you're planning to attend college, you will need two credits in the SAME world language

## Grade Point Average - GPA


- GPA 2.0 cumulative unweighted or higher
  - ∘ 2.0 is a "C" average
  - Check HAC regularly to keep track of grades

# What we need to know about GPA:

- GPA's update after every semester:
  - In January, after semester 1 grades post
  - In the summer, after semester 2 grades post
- AP, Dual Enrollment, and honors counts towards your weighted GPA
- Only unweighted GPA counts towards graduation and qualifications for Dual Enrollment

#### Grade Recovery

Students who have earned a grade of D or F in a course can retake the course for grade recovery online or Edmentum. Once the new higher grade is earned the Registrar's office will zero out the failing or D grade and replace with the higher grade and re-calculate your GPA and credits. Please note that the original grade of D or F will remain on your transcript but will not affect your GPA. (NCAA guidelines – collegiate athletes cannot take grade recovery through Edmentum but must complete grade recovery on FLVS or SJVS)

- The state allows us to grade average one semester that is failed with a semester that is passing to pass a course and earn credits. We still recommend re-taking the half credit failed course for grade recovery.
- The website for online grade recovery is <a href="www.flvs.net">www.flvs.net</a> Counselor approval is needed to take any course for grade recovery.
- Grade recovery labs can be scheduled on your BTHS schedule to complete during the school year. Prior to summer break Counselors will recommend grade recovery courses through Edmentum that can be completed at home over the summer months.

- 9th to 10th Grade
  - 5 credits
- 10th to 11th Grade
  - 11 credits
- 11th to 12th Grade
  - 17 credits



### Community Service



- Not needed for graduation
- Needed for \$\$ (scholarships, including Bright Futures)
- Community service verification letters can be turned into Ms. Richards in the school counseling area of the main building or emailed <u>Kathleen.Richards@stjohns.k12.fl.us</u>
- Copy of pay stubs for work hours performed must be turned into Mrs.
  Richards also. A reflection log for service activity or work can be picked up in
  main Guidance area. Answer all questions and parent/student sign at the
  bottom.
- We can combine work hours and community service hours this year.
- Your goal should be to finish 100 hours of community service by the end of 11th grade

- We suggest students keep a copy of the community service verification letters.



- Have the Supervisor of your community service provide a signed letter with name of student, and date on the organization's letterhead describing the type of service performed, who in the community the service benefited, and a description of the service event. The amount of service hours should also be included. Student and parent should also sign this letter at the bottom.
- For paid work, student will need to submit a copy of their pay stub to Mrs. Richards in Guidance.
- Make a copy of all completed forms for your records.
- Student must provide letterhead and Community Service Plan to Mrs. Richards to be included with all required signatures
- Please allow 10 -14 days for hours to be updated in HAC. Students can check their hours by logging into HAC and clicking on the registration tab.
